God may be trying to tell me something. In fact, He might be trying to tell many of us something. This

has been a season of trials and triumphs. We have each had to wrestle with the global pandemic in different ways. Some of us are living with more fear than usual, others are living with more faith. For most of us, it is a mixture of both. Let me explain a bit more about the question. I'll use a brief case study as an example.


In the meantime, we are collecting videos of hope from Hope Angels to share with their Kugaba child once school is back in session. If you would like to send an encouraging message to your child, please
