

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
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
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A Season of Tremendous Growth

n 2012, Hope Haven Christian School began teaching colors, letters and numbers to 97 students under a tree. Twelve years later, school enrollment is more than 1,800 students—a growth of over 1700%! In the last two years alone, since opening the doors of the secondary school, enrollment has more than doubled—from 873 to 1,814 students throughout the campus. Truly, these numbers are staggering. The most important thing to remember is how blessed we are to be able to educate more students, hire more parents, and impact more families than ever—all by God's power and for God's glory.

We currently employ over 250 staff on our Murindi, Rwanda campus. Every position from Head of School to part-time cleaning staff is a blessing from God for the community that is "Hope Haven Rwanda." Most of our cooking and cleaning staff are parents of our students, the vast majority of whom did not have the opportunity to attend school when they were young. They recognize what a gift education is, and they work diligently to provide this opportunity for their children. Not only will their children lift their entire families out of poverty with a secondary school education, they will also positively impact

the village of Murindi, the city of Kigali, the country of Rwanda, and the continent of Africa with their humble and hardworking attitudes.

In addition to paid employees, nearly 800 parents of students serve on campus each month to cover the small amount of fees required for their child to attend

Hope Haven! These parents work hard in the fields of our campus, tending to the crops and grounds, assisting with growing many foods their children eat in their nutritious meals each day on campus. Indeed, over one million meals will be prepared and served on campus this year! In a country where food insecurity is prevalent, this is yet another blessing of enrollment and employment at Hope Haven.

Numbers don't tell the full story of the impact Hope Haven is having on this village, but they do speak to the magnitude of how God is working as well as the foundation being laid for the hope of this generation and all who will follow. A Field of **Dreams**

he iconic phrase, "If you build it, they will come," has indeed manifested itself at Hope Haven Christian School. In March of this year, a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held to celebrate the opening of the Secondary School Sports Complex. Its strategic location, adjacent to the academic and dormitory buildings, gives students easy access, encouraging them to participate in various sports and activities.

The complex features a regulation soccer pitch, two basketball/volleyball courts, pickleball courts, and a three-lane running track. The soccer pitch is complete with stadium seating to allow families, fellow students, and visiting teams to spectate and cheer on players. And the construction team is working to build restrooms and locker rooms for both teams and visitors.

The construction of this outdoor sports complex is an investment in the future of the students at Hope Haven. It is a testament to the school's belief in the power of sports to shape character, instill discipline, and promote a healthy lifestyle. The facilities will enhance the physical well-being of the students and foster a sense of camaraderie and unity among them.

Physical education teachers Corneille Iradukunda Tuyishime and Moise Rutinduka are looking forward to students being able to use the complex during class periods as well as organizing weekend competitions for students for fun and skill development. "They will be free to experience a lot just because that space is so big and open, so each student will get involved in his or her preferred sport," shares Corneille.

In addition, the teachers anticipate increasing the school's ability to compete with other local schools. Hope Haven already has competitive teams in boys and girls basketball, boys and girls volleyball and boys soccer. With the addition of the new complex, they are hoping to form a girls soccer team as well. Cornielle says, "Our school has been performing well in competitions as we have strong track records of achievements.

The new sports will be crucial for raising a conducive environment for training and competition, and a will to win among athletes." The girls volleyball team was ranked highest in Kigali last year.

Acknowledging the growing popularity of pickleball, four pickleball courts have been included in the complex. This emerging sport takes much less space than tennis and offers students a unique opportunity to engage in a sport that requires hand-eye coordination, agility, and strategy. Moise shares, "Let me talk about pickleball. It is an interesting game and not common here. But as we were being coached by our Founder, Susan, and talking about the rules in class, the students were eager and had fun playing."

Even in all the excitement, there is recognition that the sports complex is more than just a group of fields and courts it's a beacon of hope for the community. This massive construction project has provided employment to many local village residents, including parents of students. These wonderful people now have an opportunity to provide for their families through the work they're doing. Their collective enthusiasm and hard work are truly heartwarming. It is also a bold statement of Hope Haven's commitment to our students and the greater community, to offer the very best facilities, opportunities, and resources possible. It serves as a reminder of the boundless potential that lies within each and every one of us, and we can't wait to see the incredible things our students and athletes will accomplish here!


SUMMER SKILLS CAMP

In July 2023, a groundbreaking initiative was launched with the introduction of Summer Skills Camp at Hope Haven Christian School. The primary aim was to provide focused academic support for struggling students in their areas of weakness. This innovative concept swiftly materialized into reality as students embarked on a transformative six-week journey, guided by dedicated teachers, in preparation for their second sitting exams. These exams were pivotal, determining whether students would progress to the next grade level. The program extended its hand not only to those who fell below a 70% average in their third term but also to students struggling in core subjects. It served as a beacon of hope for those seeking to catch up, offering a lifeline of academic support and encouragement.



Career & Academic Counseling with Work-Based Learning Opportunities

We teach soft skills such as eye contact, hand shaking, speech, and communication; assess skills, vocational interests, and personalities; and counsel on career choices. We work hard with each grade level, starting with Senior 1 (7th grade), but many choices culminate at the end of Senior 3 (9th grade). A student can choose a vocational route (see page

13) or a combination of studies (academic focus) that will direct their career choices.



Supporting Our Students in Educational Transition


In Rwanda, there is a gap of time before students who complete Senior 6 (12th grade) can begin their post-secondary education. We plan to work with these students to develop next-stage living skills including personal finance, cooking, navigating transportation options to travel to a job, and time management. These students will also be enabled to take advantage of STEM classes and other course work online; offer their skills as teachers and tutors in local government schools; tutor students at Hope Haven in the evening; be teaching assistants in Hope Haven's nursery and primary classes; offer their help and skills at local hospitals; and serve in internships at local entrepreneurial businesses and government entities.

Selecting Universities, Obtaining Scholarships and Internships

Our students desire to be doctors, engineers, IT professionals, business owners/entrepreneurs, manufacturers, pilots, drivers, tourism and hospitality workers, soldiers, ministers in government, bankers, accountants, radio and TV announcers, journalists, teachers, and lawyers. We will work with them to apply for acceptance to universities and scholarships to fund their post-secondary education. Due to most families' financial situations, scholarships will be necessary for the vast majority of our students to continue their education.

Our staff will work with partners in the community, linking initiatives to help students be intentionally placed in jobs and to ensure every student is thriving in the job market, whether they attend university, vocational schools, or enter the labor market directly after secondary school. In addition, we will partner with others to develop entrepreneurs and help students start businesses

In 8–10 years we will have an established alumnus emerging in governance, medicine, IT, tourism and hospitality, engineering, business, teaching, and industry. These individuals will be the engine for future local support, continuing to provide opportunities to the next generation of Rwandans. They will be role models and invest in the next generation by providing internships, insight into post-secondary education and career paths, and scholarships for primary/secondary education.

(FK): To provide leadership to the Education department, oversee the daily operation of the entire school and ensure effective teaching and learning processes.

(PN): To ensure that students' well-being is at the forefront of the decisions made by the school and that students are supported in all areas of school life.

(EN): My most important contributions to the school include curriculum implementation, offering supportive feedback to all teachers, monitoring academic standards and implementing strategies that maintain the academic momentum within the school.

(SO): My role is crucial in ensuring that the school provides high quality education that empowers students to reach their full potential academically and prepares them for success in their future endeavors as Christian World Leaders.

wo years ago, our family set out on a journey to shape the perspective of our four young boys. We sold everything and walked away from corporate America in pursuit of adventure, culture, and service work. Little did we know our path would lead us to one of the most densely populated countries in all of Africa—Rwanda. And little did we know our lives would forever be changed!

Upon touching down in the "land of a thousand hills" we climbed into a 4x4 and ventured towards a town that would quickly grab ahold of all of our hearts. Where the pavement ended, the red dirt roads began, and so did our story.

Nestled into thick, lush greenery sits the most amazing school we've ever witnessed. Yes, the buildings and technology are impressive, but it was the people who separated it from all others.

We were greeted with smiles that stretched as far as the Virunga Mountains span. Those smiles were accompanied with hugs and laughter, and in an instant we felt a part of something much greater than we ever could have imagined.

In the days to follow, we spent countless hours with the incredible children. Whether we were walking hand-in-hand with the young children fetching water from the local waterhole for their families before and after school, or building mud homes for their families, these authentic opportunities allowed us to get to know each kid and their story. We spent hours praying with and for these families, asking the Lord to lay His desires on our hearts and asking for the strength to act on those desires.

We intentionally inquired about some of the most vulnerable students. One of those students happened to be little Rachel. She and her mother lived alone in a 10'x10' mud hut with no electricity. Their worn mattress was draped in a tattered mosquito net and laid directly on the mud floor. There was a small pile of clothes folded neatly next to the bed, sitting in the mud as well. There was nothing else to the home. Their door had no lock; the hut had no windows.

Yet, mother and daughter welcomed us with the brightest of smiles. They embraced us and invited us in to sit on the floor and talk. How could someone with so little be so content, so grateful, so joyful?

Over the course of the month we were at Hope Haven, we got to know Rachel and her mother well. We learned their personal story. The challenges they had endured tugged on all of our heartstrings and we began praying for God to reveal ways to share our blessings with them.

Today, Rachel and her mother live in a 2-bedroom home with concrete floors, several windows, and a door that locks. They have new mattresses and dishware and clothing. They have new living room furniture to host guests. Their rent has been paid in full for the year, and they have a new Bible written in their local language, Kinyarwanda.


Our four boys gained the sister they'd always hoped to have and a perspective they never would have gained here in the States.

Between the amazing teachers and the students, there was an infectious love and dedication for learning, which we would soon realize is one of the primary ways these students will have opportunities few will ever know in the surrounding villages.

Beyond the classroom, our hearts were stirred by encounters with the families of these students. Sharing conversations in their humble homes, adorned with colorful fabrics and the aroma of woodfire cooking, offered a glimpse into their daily struggles to provide the basic needs for life and unwavering resilience. We witnessed firsthand the transformative impact Hope Haven is having on the community around them, not just in academic growth but in the hope it instills within these families.

One particularly poignant moment came during the construction of a traditional mud hut for a Hope Haven family. Working alongside community members, sweat dripping from our foreheads under the midday sun, we felt a tangible connection to their lives. It wasn't just about bricks and mortar; it was about shared effort, cultural exchange, and the satisfaction of building something together that would have a great impact on a family's lives.

Another unforgettable experience was visiting the community well, the lifeblood of the village. Witnessing the long lines of women and children patiently waiting with jerrycans, we gained a deeper appreciation for the preciousness of water, a resource we often take for granted. Our kids will never forget the nearly 1-mile trek back up to the homes in the village carrying the heavy jugs of water these kids and families carry every day, multiple times a day.

But our journey wasn't solely about service. The richness of Rwandan culture unfolded before us-spirited dance performances, the rhythmic pounding of drums, and the infectious joy of singing praise and worship during the school's Sunday church services with the students. Evenings were spent sharing stories around crackling bonfires, forging lifelong friendships with fellow volunteers and the incredible Hope Haven staff.

As we reluctantly said goodbye, our hearts overflowed with gratitude. We left not just with souvenirs and photographs but with a renewed sense of purpose, a deeper understanding of global challenges, and the unwavering belief in the power of community and compassion.

If you're considering a similar life-changing experience, here are some key takeaways:

- Open your mind and heart: Embrace cultural differences and be willing to learn from the community
- Step outside your comfort zone: Challenge yourself and discover hidden strengths and perspectives.
- **Engage with the community:** Don't just observe; actively participate and build meaningful relationships.
- Seek opportunities to serve: Look for ways to use your skills and resources to make a positive impact.
- Reflect and share: Carry the lessons learned and inspire others to make a difference in the world.

But she sees the big planes when they fly over Hope Haven and that inspires her. Annabelle told her how it feels to be flying and they looked at photos of different kinds of airplanes online.

A very special moment between the girls was when Annabelle unpacked her transverse flute to play a little tune for Agape. The young Rwandan had never seen such an instrument before, and she was even allowed to try out playing the flute. "Not so easy," she realized with amusement. Another cherished moment was spent drawing together, a beloved hobby shared by both girls.

In the end, the journey not only afforded Ben and Annabelle precious moments of shared quality time but also deepened a friendship bond with Agape.










A PRACTICAL YET STYLISH GIFT FROM OUR ANGELS

Remember ing the Rwandan Genocide





n the Kinyarwanda language, **kwibuka** means "to remember." April 2024 marks 30 years of remembering the 1994 genocide and reflecting on Rwanda's story of reconciliation and nation building.

Most Americans have heard of the genocide, but don't know many details. Visitors to Hope Haven Rwanda learn all about it with an unforgettable "field trip" to the Kigali Genocide Memorial.

Understanding how the country came to such a dark place means unpacking the history. Ethnic Tutsis and Hutus once lived peacefully, but with longstanding tensions. Due to social and economic status, Tutsi were generally the "ruling" majority. While under colonial rule in 1932, Belgium introduced identity cards that distinguished people by tribe: Hutu, Tutsi and Twa people.

Once Rwanda became an independent nation in 1962, the Hutu took control, and many Tutsis fled the country. In the 1980's, discrimination against the Tutsi became official policy and sadly, such discrimination was endorsed by certain religious leaders in Rwanda.

Just after peace accords were signed in April of 1994, extremist radical Hutus reacted with a final solution to kill all Tutsis. They mobilized the population – urging neighbor to kill neighbor, friend to kill friend, down to the last infant.

Vicious attacks against the Tutsi began on April 7, 1994. Over 800,000 people were killed before military forces finally stopped the genocide in July.

Rwanda suffered both physical and psychological effects. Almost every Rwandan citizen found themselves displaced and grieving. Communities, homes, schools, hospitals, and crops were destroyed. Food was scarce and World Vision estimated that 75,000 children lost one or both parents.

Looking at Rwanda thirty years later, most ask the question: How does a county heal after such a horrific event?

In his speech at the 2024 U.S. National Prayer Breakfast in

Washington D.C., Rwanda's President Kagame answered just such a question, one which he confessed he has asked himself for the past 30 years and still doesn't have all the answers.

"Today our country, against all odds, is peaceful, flourishing, entrepreneurial, and most importantly, united," said Kagame. "But Rwanda's experience is more than a story. It's a warning about what happens when we allow hatred to triumph over humanity.

A genocide can happen when a society loses faith in the future, when it loses faith in the power of faith itself, and when it can no longer distinguish truth from deceit. A genocide can happen when political leaders preach division and hatred while people of faith and people of science remain silent."

While executing justice, leaders also focused on forgiveness and reconciliation. Kagame continued, "The desire for retribution was huge. We could not allow people to take justice into their own hands. We had to break the cycle of violence and convert the urge for vengeance into a national program of unity and reconciliation."

Kagame knows it was difficult to ask the survivors to forgive. "Reconciliation is an act of faith because it requires a leap of the imagination, a belief in the unseen, a reality all your senses tell you is impossible. This is also the reason why faith leaders were key partners in our effort to rebuild after the genocide."

By faith, Rwandans continue to work toward these goals 30 years later, and visitors can see the results. While scars remain, the Rwandans are kind, loving, and proud of their beautiful country. Perhaps by remembering, no other nation or people group will ever face such darkness again. ��

Let Them Write the Next Chapter of Janda

hen I look at the students at Hope Haven Christian School, I am amazed to see how far they've come. But what really takes my breath away is knowing how far they will go from here.

Hope Haven Christian School has been a work of the Lord. When we opened in 2012, classes were held in a tent, a mud house, and under a tree for the 97 students who showed up for school that first day. Since then, we have grown by faith with the support of many partners, and today have a 220,000 square foot facility with over 65 classrooms, four computer labs, three science labs and two dedicated libraries. Over 1,800 students call Hope Haven home, with full boarding for almost 720 of them from every province of Rwanda.

The fruit has been overwhelming

The students follow a curriculum that's more rigorous than any you will find in Europe or North America. And in national exams, Hope Haven students routinely place in the top 3% of the country. These are children who have come from poverty - with little to no educational opportunities. Now they are succeeding at the highest level, simply because they were given the chance at an excellent education. This is not "better than what they had," it is exceeding standards across the developed world!

For Rwanda, 2024 is critical

While Hope Haven Christian School cannot address the problem of millions of children not being in school, we have done a lot with "the ones in front of us." Sub-Saharan Africa is in the midst of a demographic boom which will double the working- age population in the next 30 years. Hope Haven's "Christ focused" students will be the leaders of tomorrow to harness the human capital. Our students will be the entrepreneurs to build a diverse workforce that can lead in business, technology, medicine, and agriculture to address food security; to create a true middle class and make waves that will ripple down through generations, transforming the futures of Rwandans who haven't even been born yet.

Hope Haven students are ready to rise up and meet the needs of their nation. They know who they are in Christ, and they know what they are capable of. Many joined us at the age of three. Soon, they will be part of the first graduating class in 2025. They are leading thinkers of their generation!

The next step they take is the one that matters most

To develop these students into Christian leaders and build a bridge for them into the working world, we're launching The Hope Haven Leadership Institute. (see pgs 10-11) The goal is to equip students with the skills, knowledge, and values necessary to excel in leadership roles while maintaining a Christian perspective. These students will be prepared to attend the best East African Universities armed with scholarships, internships and finally jobs to change the trajectory of their families and their country!

It's a bold vision that God has called us to. Stay tuned for updates on needs for new infrastructure as we step into this new stage. By building the Hope Haven Leadership Institute, we will complete the bridge into the working world and let our students write the next chapter of Rwanda.


